



SPOTLIGHT ON YEAR-ROUND PROGRAMS

Our free, outdoor screening series is one of a kind in the city, with a focus on showing widely loved films that represent and resonate with Indigenous, Black, and people of colour communities. Each year, Under the Stars: Movies in the Park draws in more of the Regent Park community and the GTA than the last! This year's program was online and we hope to return to the park again soon!

The Regent Park Project empowers youth from Regent Park and beyond with opportunities to develop their acting, writing and filmmaking skills through hands-on workshops in creating their own web series. An example of inter-cultural dialogue in action, the project has completed two seasons on their web series, which can be seen at RegentParkProject.com.



Each year, the Regent Park Film Festival kicks off with the School Program, a series of films for younger audiences from the community. Featuring films from around the world and across genres, the program not only reflects these students' diverse lived experiences, but asks them to situate themselves and their community within a broader context. This year's school program online will be available to educators outside of the Festival dates for greater access.

Block by Block is a participatory, multimedia program of the Toronto Ward Museum. We train young people to interview community members in their own neighbourhoods about their lived experiences of migration, settlement and civic life. FAQ

HOW DO I WATCH THIS YEAR'S FESTIVAL? DO I NEED TO SUBSCRIBE?

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, we have made the decision to move this year's festival online. This year's Festival is being presented as a video on demand experience (example: Netflix, Crave etc.) using our Cinesend platform. Instead of tickets to individual screenings, you subscribe on our website to access the entire catalogue of films and panels all at once for free (with the exception of the Emerging Directors' Pitch competition which is Live at 7pm, Sunday, November 29).

WHEN CAN I START WATCHING FILMS AND PANELS?

All programming (with the exception of the Emerging Directors' Pitch Competition) will be made available to view on the first day of the festival on November 26 at 6PM and will be available to view until 11:59 pm on Sunday, November 29.

IS THE FESTIVAL STILL FREE?

Yes, the Regent Park Film Festival is Toronto's longest running free community Film Festival and we continue to make our programming free to the public.

CAN I WATCH THE FESTIVAL TITLES ONCE THE FESTIVAL IS OVER?

Regent Park Film Festival will make recordings of our industry and professional development sessions, talkbacks and panels available after the Festival is finished but unfortunately, the short films and features will no longer be available to watch after the Festival is over.

I LIVE OUTSIDE CANADA. CAN I STILL WATCH THE FESTIVAL?

No, all of our content is restricted to viewers in Canada, with the exception of the film The Outside Story which is only available to viewers in Ontario.

IS THE FESTIVAL ACCESSIBLE?

All films are captioned and/or subtitled in English. Some pre-recorded content is available with ASL interpretation.

HOW DO I TURN CAPTIONS ON/OFF

Open captions (oc) are part of the video itself and cannot be turned off while closed captions can be turned on or off within the player through clicking this button at the bottom right of your player.

CAN I WATCH ON OTHER DEVICES?

Yes you can using Chromecast using your laptop and google chrome to cast your Cinesend viewing experience to your devices. Unfortunately you cannot cast from your mobile phone.

WHAT ARE THE SYSTEM REQUIREMENTS?

Our Festival can be accessed on Intel-based Macs running OSX 10.12+ and PCs running Windows 7+ as well as Iphones and Ipads using Safari (iOS 11.2 or later with "screen mirroring" turned off), and Android phones and tablet (6.0) using chrome

WHAT ARE THE SUPPORTED BROWSERS?

Google Chrome, Firefox, Microsoft Edge (PC), and Opera. We recommend using the latest version of your browser. Internet Explorer is not supported.

ANGELA BRITTO

Angela Britto has been the Executive Director of the Regent Park Film Festival since 2019. She is a writer and arts administrator who came to the Festival from the public sector where she supported increased access to arts and culture in Ontario. She has a background in communications, stakeholder relations, and program management that she developed at arts organizations such as Cultural Pluralism in the Arts Movement Ontario (CPAMO), Scarborough Arts, the Ontario Arts Council and the Professional Association of Canadian Theatres.

She has an MA in English from the University of Pennsylvania and her creative writing most recently appeared in The Unpublished City II (2018).



FADUMA GURE

Faduma Gure is a Toronto-based curator and arts organizer. As the founder of The Black Nerds, Faduma is dedicated to hosting and cultivating spaces for Black nerds. Past Black Nerds events included video game tournaments, art exhibits and film screenings. Faduma Gure is also a co-founder of Own the Walls- a curatorial project that showcases the work of emerging BIPOC artists.

Awe:ri is a nationally recognized Spoken Word Artist, Arts Educator, Musician, Land Defender & Water Protector, Public Speaker, Performance Artist, Curator and Afro-Indigenous Futurist Writer & Digital Artist, who was awarded the 2019-2020 Paula Fund for the development of new works for younger audiences for her acclaimed solo work Tionnhéhkwen Tionnká:non.

OPENING NIGHT PRESENTATION: BEING BLACK IN TORONTO + TALKBACK PANEL

ISMAILA ALFA

Ismaila Alfa has been named the new host of Toronto's top-rated morning radio program and show of record, METRO MORNING, beginning Monday, August 24. A CBC Radio broadcaster and journalist since 2008, Alfa most recently served as the host of CBC Winnipeg's current affairs program UP TO SPEED.

Born in Nigeria to a Nigerian father and Canadian mother. Alfa was raised in Nigeria and Winnipeg, Manitoba, where he studied civil engineering at the University of Manitoba. He toured Canada and the United States as a hip hop musician for almost a decade before joining CBC Radio in Winnipeg in 2008. In June 2013, Alfa took the helm as the host of Up to Speed, taking the show to #1 in the Winnipeg afternoon radio market.



THE ONYX BUTTERFLY

Yasmin Evering-Kerr | Short Documentary | Canada | 2019 6 min | English

The Onyx Butterfly is a Poetic and Expository Documentary which seamlessly incorporates actuality with poetic elements of dance performance. The film is an exploration of the life of a Black male ballet dancer.

The film follows Jordan as he grapples with the societal pressures of being a Black male in a traditionally white feminine landscape while also struggling against the cultural gender expectations placed upon Black men. The film aims to explore the psychological impact of stereotypes on a Black male who is determined to redefine Black masculinity.

YASMIN EVERING-KERR

Yasmin Evering-Kerr, born and raised in the cultural mosaic of the GTA, uses her roots to inspire her artistry. A recent graduate of Film Studies at Brock University, and completing her post-graduate diploma at Sheridan College. She is a passionate storyteller who frequently addresses issues of race and gender in her films.





YYZ

Omolola Ajao | Short Documentary | Canada | 2019 | 5 min | English

The film YYZ is an intimate portrayal and discussion between that of a Nigerian-Canadian family and their last-born child. For Omolola and her family, their first night in Toronto was spent in Pearson airport - that night full of anticipation, expectation, and fear. Specifically looking back at her family's journey, as well as their present and future, this film focuses on the feelings of rootlessness and loss of identity that often accompany immigration.

OMOLOLA AJAO

Omolola Ajao is a Nigerian-Canadian screenwriter, student & filmmaker. Her priority in filmmaking is authentic, raw, and human visual narratives. FUFU, the start of her filmmaking journey; reflects on the continuance and severance of West-African traditions and cultures. YYZ is an intimate portrayal of a Nigerian-Canadian family exploring flows of migration.

MR. JANE AND FINCH

Ngardy Conteh George Short Documentary | Canada 2019 | 45 min | English

Winston LaRose, an 80-year-old activist, is running for office for the first time. He is confident of winning the Ward 7 seat, however, when Doug Ford drastically changes the political landscape by cutting the number of city councillors, Winston must fight to keep his disintegrating team together, inspire a non-voting demographic, and empower the people of his beloved Jane and Finch community.

NGARDY CONTEH GEORGE

Ngardy Conteh George is an award-winning filmmaker. Her credits include Sundance Documentary Film Fund supported feature-length documentary The Flying Stars (Best documentary – BronzeLens Film Festival, 2015) and most recently, TV hour Mr. Jane and Finch (CBC) winner of two Canadian Screen Awards. Ngardy co-founded OYA Media Group.





BLACK SUN







BLAKE MAWSON

Blake Mawson is a gueer Canadian screenwriter and director and graduate of the CFC Director's Lab. In 2016, he wrote and directed his first short film. PYOTR495, a film set amidst the brutal anti-gay attacks taking place in Russia since the passing of Putin's LGBTQ propaganda law which criminalized the normalization of homosexuality. The film toured worldwide, screening everywhere from Sitges and Fantasia to Frameline and Outfest, and was awarded The National Screen Institute of Canada's A&F Filmmaker Award in 2018 as well as a 2019 Canadian Screen Award for Best Lead Performance by the film's star Alex Ozerov. Blake is currently developing his sci-fi horror series, GURNERS, which is co-written and co-created by Scott Treleaven (BUGCRUSH) and executive produced by Blue Ant Studios in partnership with Alan Cumming's Club Cumming Productions.


